Younger children

Have fun singing the song together and make up your own actions. Vary the volume of the different verses, so be very quiet when the farmer is alsleep and loud to wake him up! Explain words your child may not know the meaning off, such as dresser, hatstand and haystack.

Small World Play

Small world play is a great way of supporting children to develop their speech and language skills, especially if you play with them and model new sounds/vocabulary or link the play to a particular song or book. Farm play items are widely available and even a few animals could be used with natural resources to create lots of opportunities for play or you could gather resources together to act out the song. Farm figures and vehicles are also great to use outdoors. If you start to give a running commentary as you play or introduce a story, your child may join in or start to copy what you are doing.
