### **Younger children**

Hold your child up towards the Christmas tree and point towards the star (if you have one) or the twinkly lights. Sway to the rhythm of the rhyme as you sing and see if your child can move their focus from the lights to your face. Remember to put expression into your voice.



### **Older children**

Go outside once it is dark and look up to the stars. Talk about the weather as on a cloudy night you might not see anything. Superstition has it that when you see a falling star you can make a wish that will be accomplished.



Go for a walk and talk about the Christmas lights you can see. What other light sources are there? Car headlights, streetlights, the moon etc

Make a telescope using a cardboard tube (or your hands) and have a look out of the window. What can you see? You can play a game of 'I Spy' or chat as you describe what is there. Do this at night and look up at the sky. What can you see? Talk about stars. Can you spot any of the constellations? Have fun singing the song and look for the stars in the sky.
